Catalysts and challenges for sustainable recovery in 2022





Recovery & Resilience Facility: A unique opportunity for Greece

The **first tranche** of RRF financing – equivalent to 13% of the country's grant & loan allocation – was disbursed in August 2021 amounting to €4,0 bn

Up to €5,0 bn in grants and loans to be disbursed in 2022



Competitive corporations: Heading to an investment-led recovery

The **strength** of the competitive corporations' **balance sheets**, strong **profitability** and **cash flows** set the stage for a sharp acceleration in **investment** and **business activity**, accompanied by strong **employment** creation



Favourable prospects for Greek exports of goods and services

Goods exports grew by 25% y-o-y in 9M:2021 – to an all-time high as % of GDP

Revival of tourism and positive prospects for 2022: Tourism revenue up by 137% y-o-y in 9M:2021 – at 55% of the 9M:2019 outcome – on a steep upward trend

Covid-19 pressures intensify

The vaccination coverage remains lower than the EU average (65% vs 70%, respectively). Increased risk of **negative confidence effects** and **decline in mobility** in the coming months



Inflationary shock

The **global inflationary shock** has started to affect the Greek economy through higher energy prices, pushing HICP inflation to a **10-year high** of 2.8% y-o-y in October 2021 vs 4.1% y-o-y in the EA. The negative impact will be largely offset by government measures and sizeable cash buffers, taking a limited toll on GDP growth, but could stress weaker economic entities and households



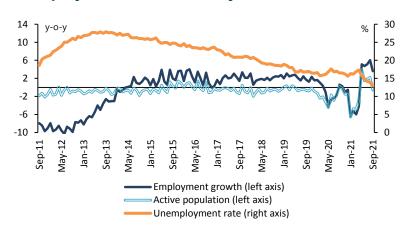

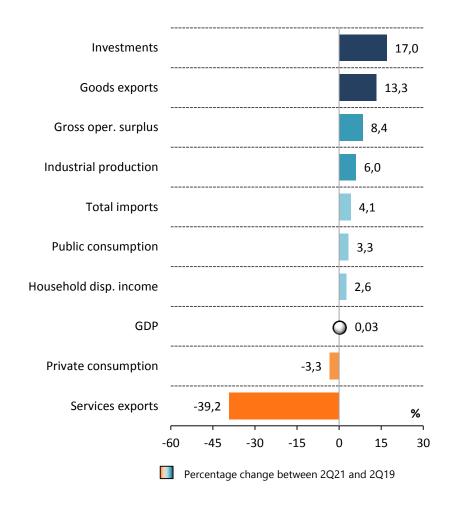
Real GDP: Heading to a V-shaped recovery

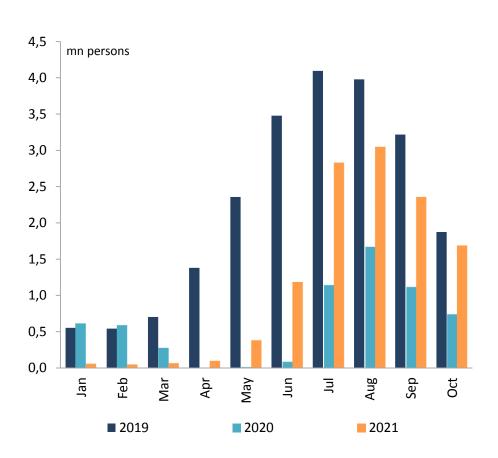

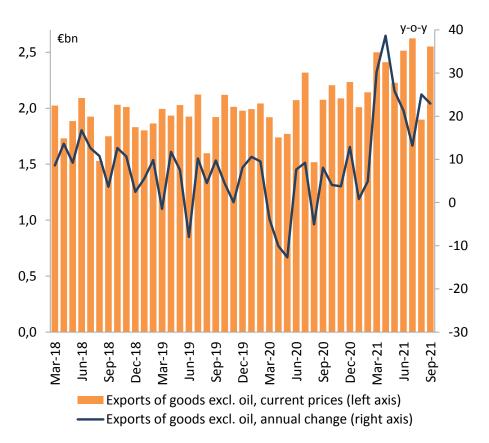
Buoyant exports of goods and services bolstered growth in 2021 with further upside in 2022

Exports of goods (excl. oil)

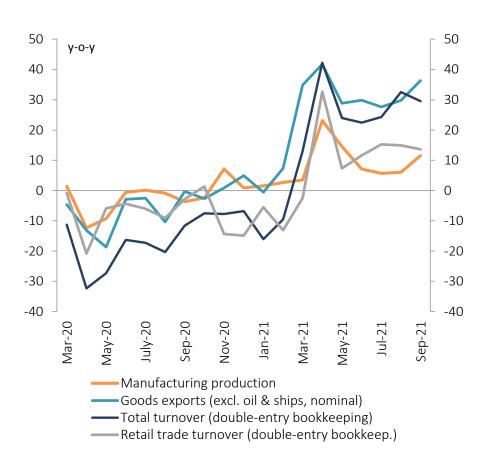

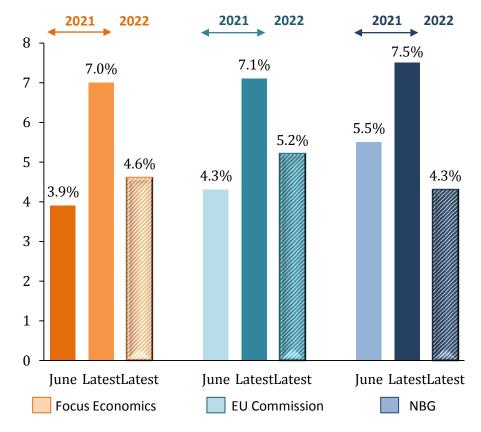

Greek GDP growth forecast for 2021 and 2022



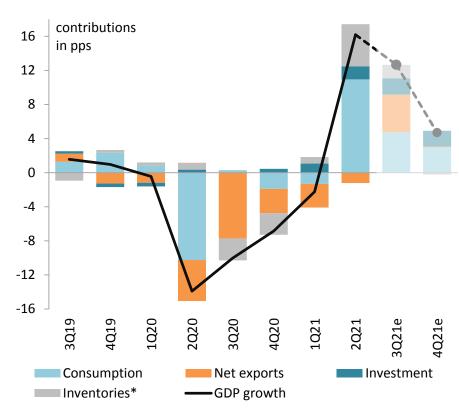

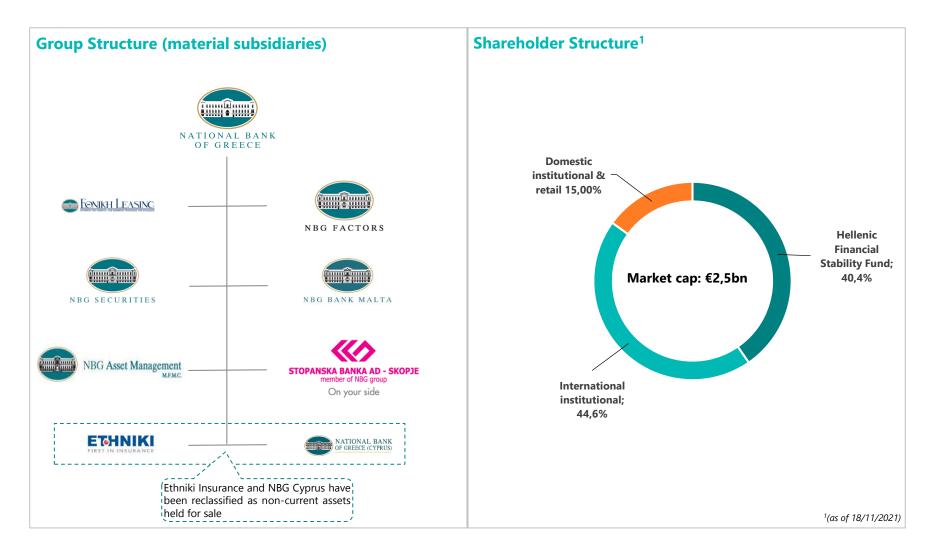

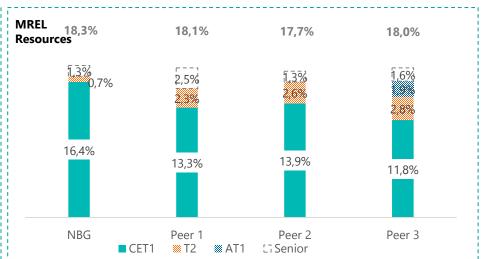
NBG credit positioning vs. domestic peers across various metrics¹



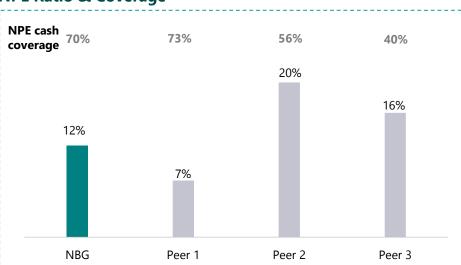

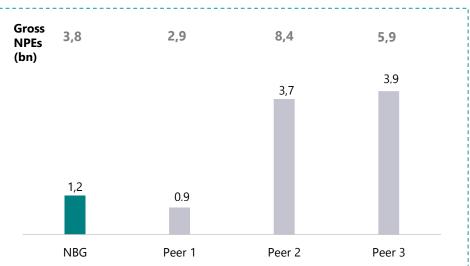

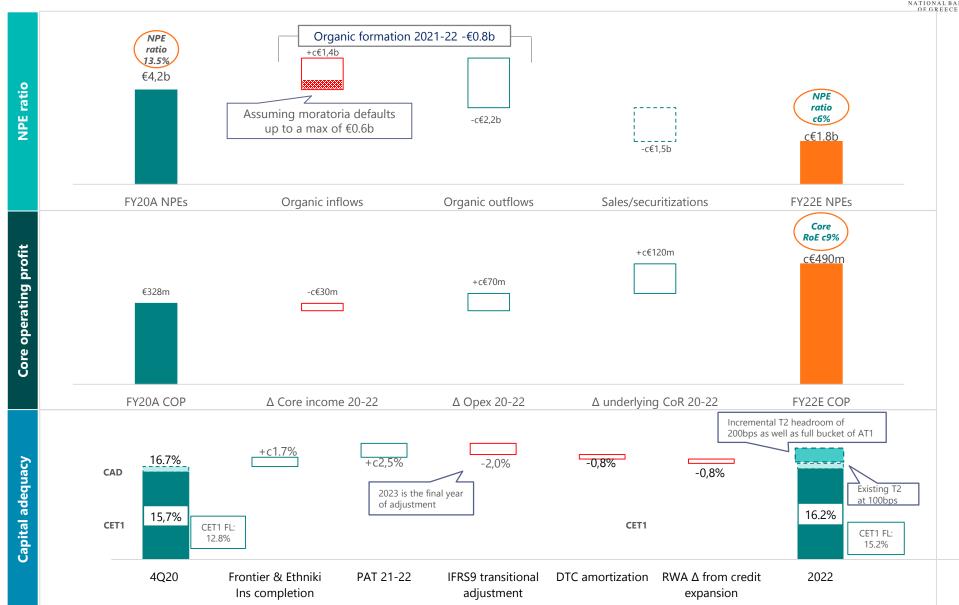
Gross & Net NPEs

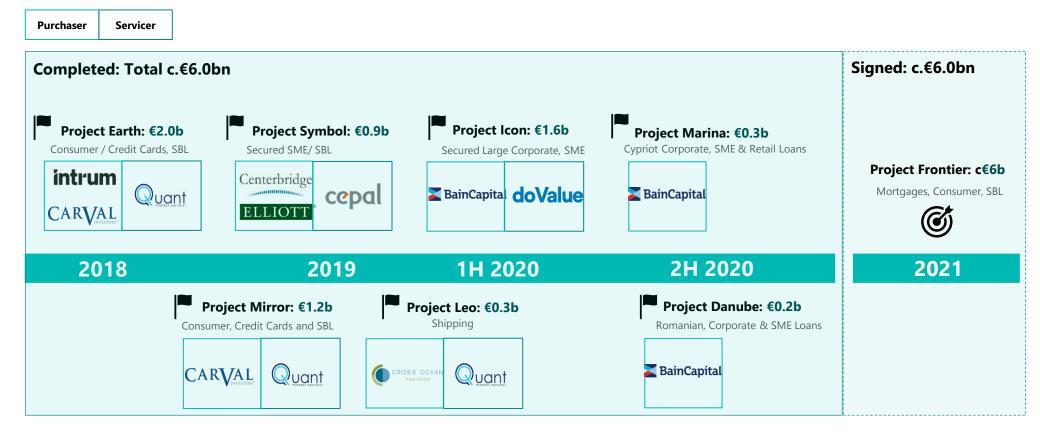

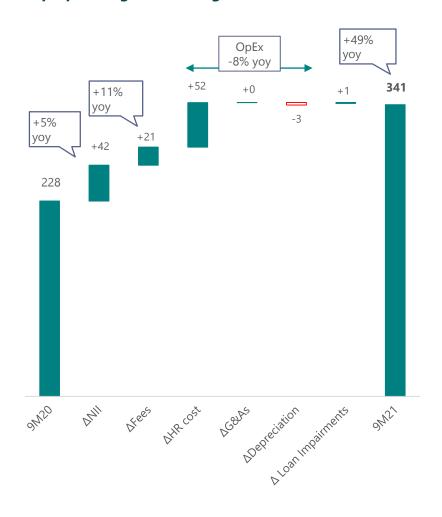

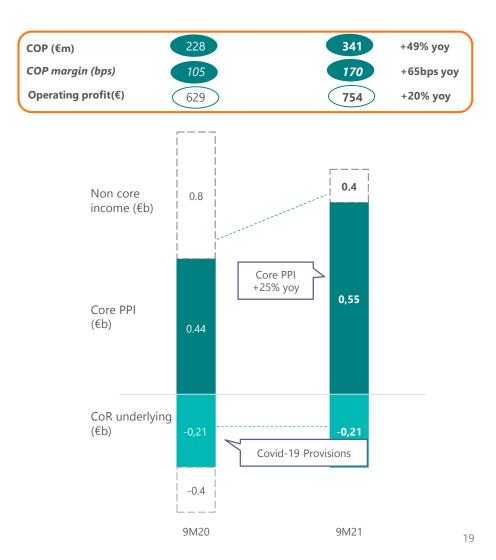

Group operating result bridge 9M21 (€ m)



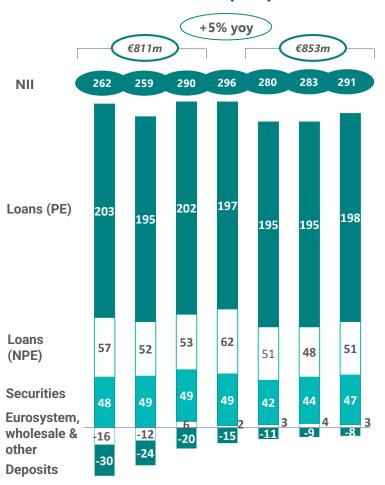
Group operating profit decomposition 9M21 (bps)



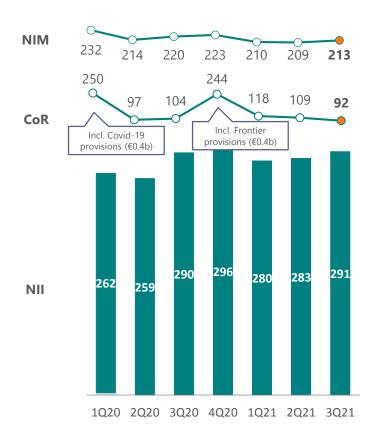

Domestic NII breakdown (€ m)



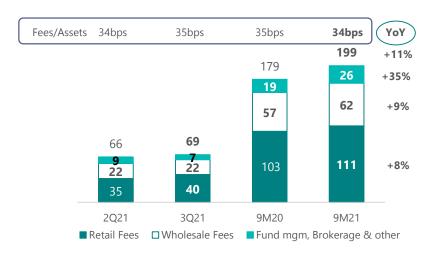

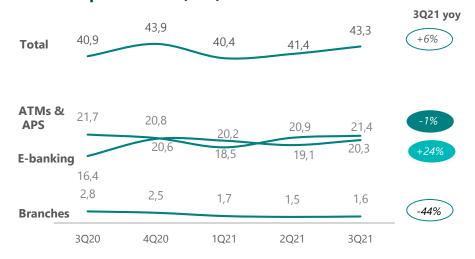

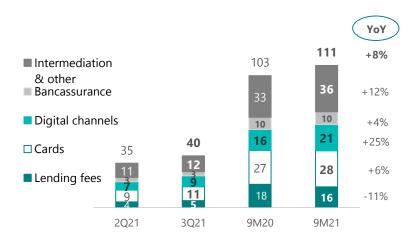

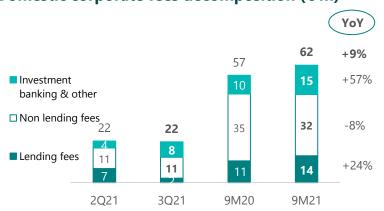

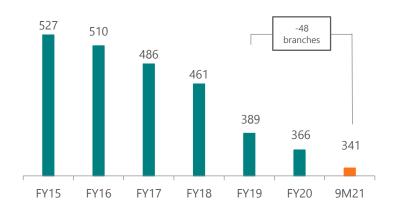

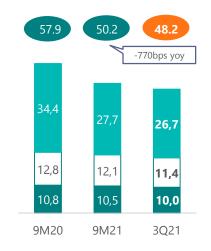

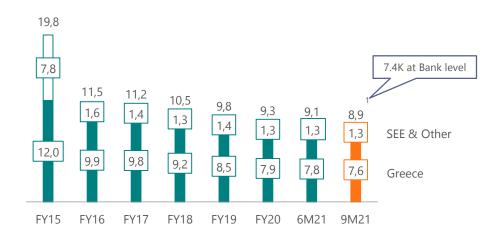


Cost over Core Income (%) breakdown





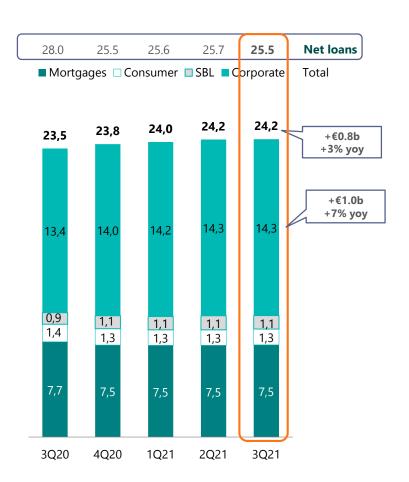

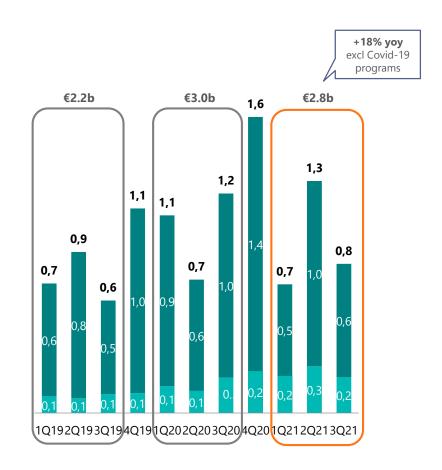

Greek loan evolution; performing loans (€ b)



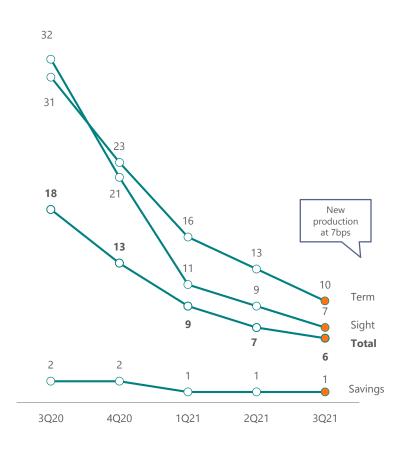

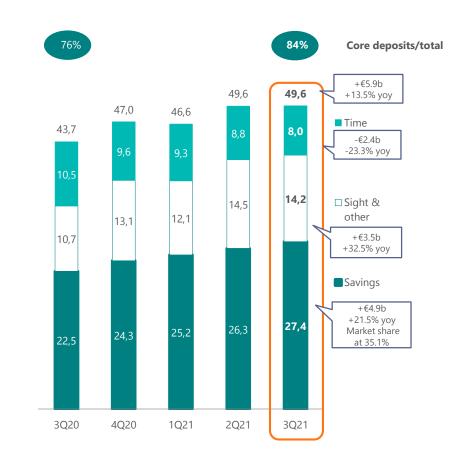
Deposit yields near zero levels driven by abundant system liquidity and negative rates

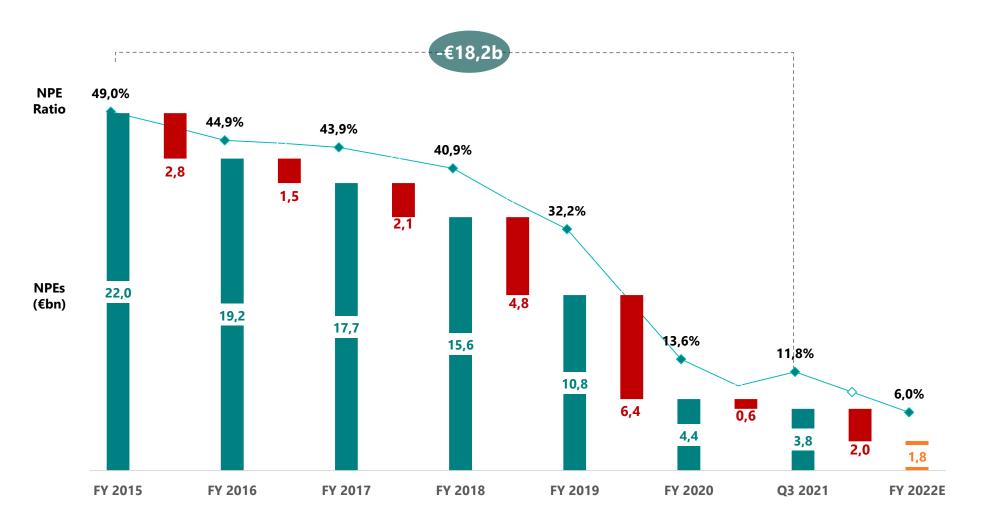

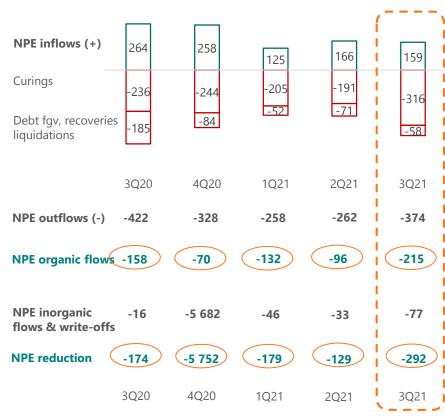
Domestic NPE stock per category – 3Q21 (€ b)

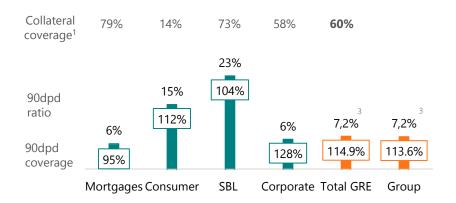

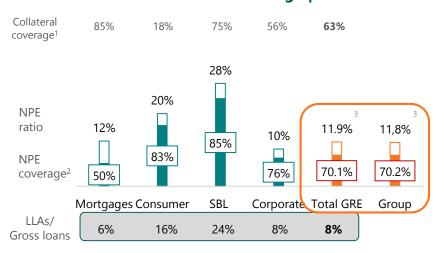
Domestic 90dpd ratios and coverage | 3Q21



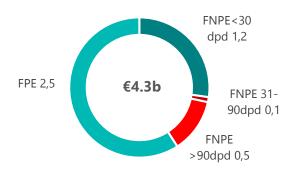
Domestic 90dpd - NPE bridge (€ b) | 3Q21

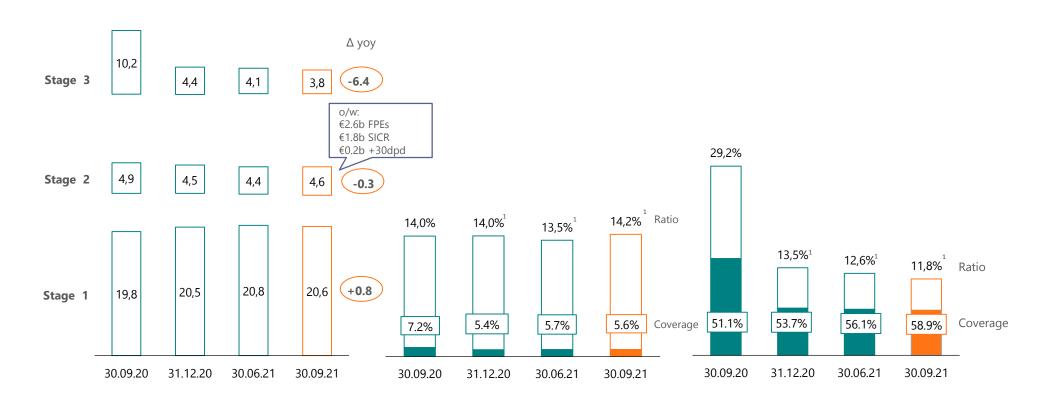

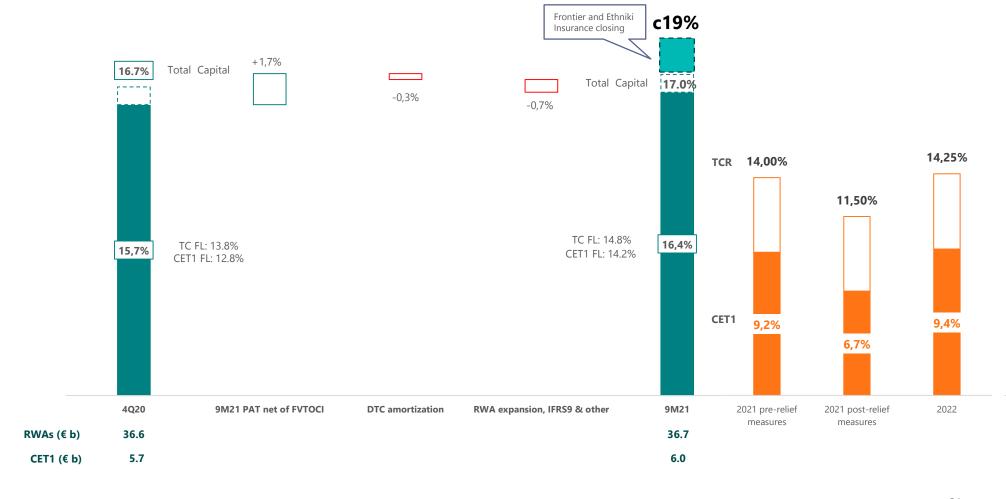

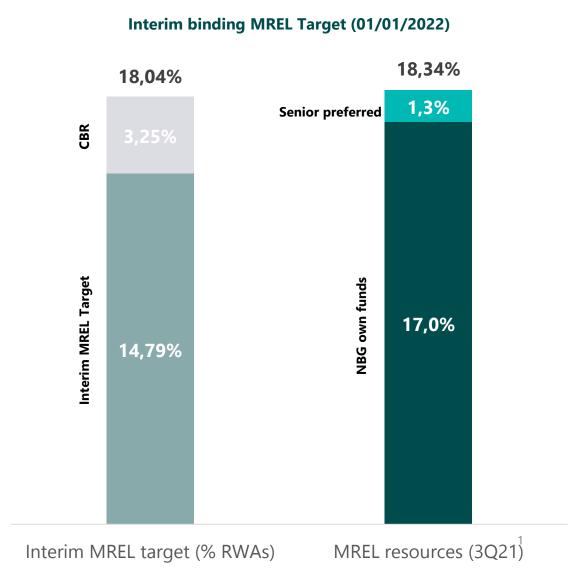

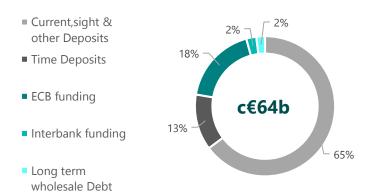

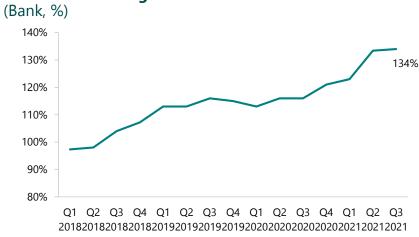




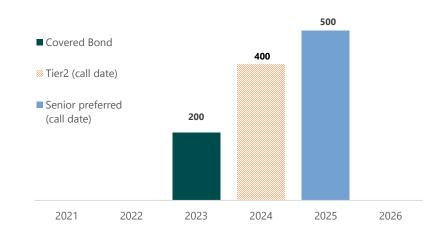
Funding structure (Bank, %)



Net Stable Funding Ratio



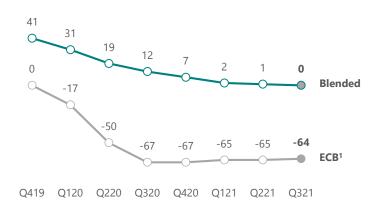
Long-term Debt Maturity Profile (€bn)*

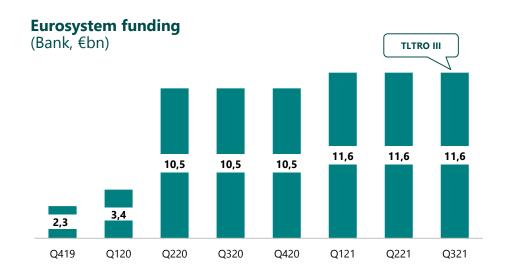

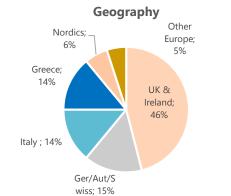


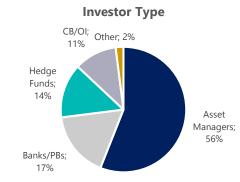
Transaction Highlights

- On October 2017, NBG completed the first Greek covered bond transaction since 2009, pricing a 3-year 750 million covered bond at 2.90% yield
- A comprehensive 4-day successful European roadshow, targeting London, Milan, Frankfurt, Munich and Athens based investors, allowed NBG to receive useful feedback.
- Having gathered sizeable IOIs ahead of execution (€850mln), NBG chose a single day execution strategy with initial price thoughts around 3.25% area, capitalizing on the momentum generated during the roadshow.
- The orderbook built rapidly, reaching over €1.25b in less than an hour, and exceeded €2b within three hours, allowing the joint leads to set the final guidance at 3% area (+-10bps) and setting the final size at €750m.
- On 6th of July 2018, S&P rated NBG's 15 billion Covered Bond Programme II at BBB-. The covered bonds issued under the programme became the first investment grade bonds issued by Greece's financial sector since 2011

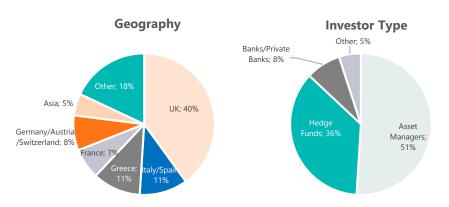

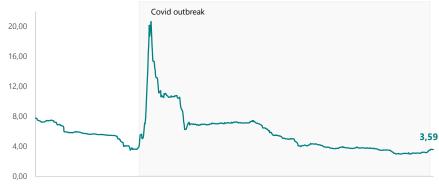

- On Thursday 11th July, National Bank of Greece S.A. priced a €400m 10NC5 Tier 2 bond at 8.25%
- The Transaction, marked NBG's reintroduction to the unsecured market since the last senior unsecured issued back in April 2014
- The issuance attracted a diverse pool of investor interest amounting to c€1.7bn from c140 institutional investors. The vast majority of interest came from international investors (c90%).
- On the back of two days of roadshow and investor calls, NBG opened books setting IPTs at 9% area
- With the support of high quality orders in excess of €1.35bn, NBG revised guidance at 8.5% area
- The final orderbook, reaching c€1.7bn, allowed the Bank to further tighten the yield by 25bps finalizing a €400m transaction at 8.25%

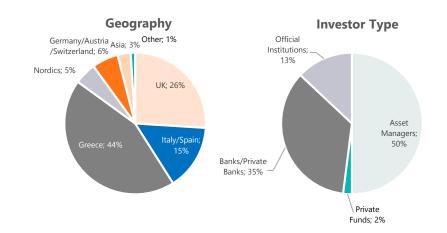

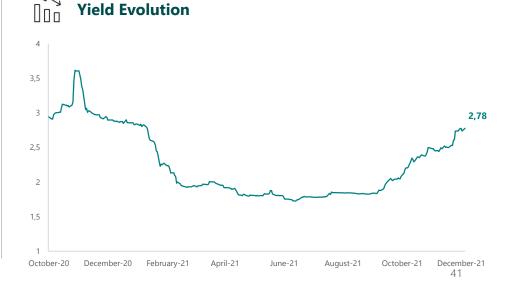


Transaction Highlights

- On Thursday 1st October 2020, National Bank of Greece S.A. ("NBG") priced its Inaugural Green EUR500m 6NC5 senior preferred
- The Transaction, followed NBG's Tier 2 issuance back in 2019 signaling the first green bond from a Greek bank, the first MREL senior transaction from a Greek bank and the first senior unsecured transaction from a Greek bank in more than 6 years
- The issuance attracted a diverse pool of investor interest amounting to c€1.1bn from c80 institutional investors
- The green label generated a lot of attention with high quality accounts and c.30% of allocations were placed with investors that are highly committed to responsible investing
- On the back of two days of roadshow and investor calls, NBG opened books setting IPTs at 3.125% area
- With the support of high quality orders peaking at c.€1.35bn, NBG managed to tighten the yield by 25 bps inside IPTs finalizing a transaction of EUR500m at 2.875%.

Additionally, it contains financial data which is compiled as a normal part of our financial reporting and management information systems. For instance, financial items are categorized as foreign or domestic on the basis of the jurisdiction of organization of the individual Group entity whose separate financial statements record such items.

Moreover, it contains references to certain measures which are not defined under IFRS, including "pre-provision income" ("PPI"), "net interest margin" and others, as defined below. These measures are non-IFRS financial measures. A non-IFRS financial measure is a measure that measures historical or future financial performance, financial position or cash flows but which excludes or includes amounts that would not be so adjusted in the most comparable IFRS measure. The Group believes that the non-IFRS financial measures it presents allow a more meaningful analysis of the Group's financial condition and results of operations. However, the non-IFRS financial measures presented are not a substitute for IFRS measures.
